The Unknown Henry Miller - Arthur Hoyle 2014-03-04

Henry Miller was one of the most distinctive voices in twentieth-century literature. Better known in Europe than in his native America for most of this career, he achieved international success and celebrity during the 1960s when his banned "Paris" books--beginning with *Tropic of Cancer*--were published here and judged by the Supreme Court not to be obscene. taboos was part of a broader assault on the dehumanization of man and commercialization during the postwar years. He puts Miller's alleged misogyny in the context of his satire of sexual mores in general, and makes the case for restoring this groundbreaking writer to his rightful place in the American literary canon. Miller's knowledge of these intellectual currents, along with his involvement with sidestream religious groups, inspired him to

meld his religious and literary aims into one perplexing project.
