Leaving the Fold - Stephen G. Wilson 2004
As Stephen Wilson reveals in this new book, being an apostate or defector is much more complex than a mere switch in faith. Leaving one religious group for another encompasses a whole range of processes, motives and causes whether this is within the Jewish, pagan or Christian faith. Wilson takes a sociological approach to identifying and classifying defector types and argues that apostates are defined 'more by actions than by beliefs'. Essentially, he looks at how and why people renounced one faith for another, focusing on the process of

leaving rather than entering, ie, not conversion. Within the Jewish, pagan and Christian faiths he uncovers a series of social and familial pressures brought to bear on apostates, for example in matters of inter-marriage, as well as intellectual and ideological doubts about the faith being renounced. Focusing on the period before and after Constantine, Wilson assesses the impact of the spread of Christianity as people transferred allegiance, especially from the Jewish community, and especially with regard to enforced conversion.

An unexpected subplot unfolded when Dr. Yayla found himself tailed by ISIS, and Dr. Speckhard barely missed two suicide attacks. But the authors are not deterred. As counter-terrorism experts with specialties in research psychology and law enforcement, they see ISIS as more than a terrorist group. ISIS is a brand that falsely sells dignity and purpose, justice and the restoration of glory-to vulnerable recruits-masterfully recruiting some 30,000 members online. It's the biggest influx of foreign fighters to a terrorist haven in history. Using the defectors own words, the authors intend to break the ISIS brand. They have videotaped these interviews to edit them into short clips, memes and tweets for an online counter-offensive. Speckhard and Yayla state

that disillusioned ISIS defectors are the most influential tool for countering ISIS propaganda. The persuasive voices of these defectors and the resulting videos will soon invade ISIS chat rooms where their propaganda thrives. With over one thousand active investigations in the U.S. across all 50 states, discrediting ISIS ideology is essential to stopping it.

The DMZ tour that I took as a student reporter sponsored by Korean White House and the conversations that I had

I participated in making a manual for North Korean refugees to adjust themselves to American lives such as translating the website of ORR (Office of Refugee Resettlement), the role of state governments to assist refugee resettlement including California and recording a video to explain Healthcare program for refugees. of volunteer service can you participate in? Where to find non-profit organizations for volunteer service? How to connect your major in college with volunteer service in high school? How to get the certificate from the non-profit organizations? How to be a leader of a volunteer group? How to make a club for volunteer service in high school? Who can receive a President's Volunteer Service Award (PVSA)? I hope you find the answers to the above-mentioned questions through this book. Time goes fast and life is short. Defections from the People’s Republic of China (PRC) were an important part of the narrative of the Republic of China (ROC) in Taiwan during the Cold War, but their stories have previously barely been told, less still examined, in English.

During the 1960s, 70s and 80s, the ROC government paid much special attention to these anti-communist heroes (fangong yishi). Their choices to leave behind the turmoil of the PRC were a propaganda coup for the Nationalist one-party state in Taiwan, proving the superiority of the "Free China" that they had created there. Morris looks at the stories behind these headlines, what the defectors understood about the ROC before they arrived, and how they dealt with the reality of their post-defection lives in Taiwan. He also looks at how these dramatic individual histories of migration were understood to prove essential differences between the two regimes, while at the same time showing important continuities between the two Chinese states. Surprisingly, the competition for defectors paved the way for collusion between the superpowers,

who found common cause in regulating the spaces through which defectors moved. Disputes over defectors mapped out the contours of modern state sovereignty, and defection's ideological framework hardened borders by reinforcing the view that asylum should only be granted to migrants with clear political claims. Although defection all but disappeared after the Cold War, this innovative work shows how it shaped the governance of global borders and helped forge an international refugee system whose legacy and limitations remain with us to this day.

Originally compiled and written by North Korean defector and author Lim Il, this English-language edition, thoroughly annotated by Dr. Adam Zulawnik, is a fascinating collection of thirty-four interviews with highly prominent North Korean defectors residing in South Korea,

ranging from religious figures, to artists, politicians, North Korea experts, and even divers and subway train operators. The 34 interviews herein are listed chronologically according to their date of arrival to South Korea and span almost 70 years. The book also includes six special columns addressing key issues pertaining to North Korean defectors and their lives in South Korea, such as the relationship between North Korean defectors and their South Korean counterparts (South Korean defectors to North Korea), nomenclature (how North Korean defectors have been referred to in South Korean society over time), arrival and settlement provisions from the South Korean government, the nuanced difference between defectors, defector-residents, and the displaced, North Korean defector-residents and their position in South Korean politics, and a short biography of five notable North Korean defector-residents who were not interviewed. The book is a valuable testament to North Korean defector-

residents and unique in that it provides a candid account of each individual's experience. It will prove to be especially useful to students and scholars seeking to understand the complex dynamics of North Korean society and the status of exiles in South Korea, and a vital resource for students of Korean Studies

Satellite Data, Women Defectors and Black Markets in North Korea - Maximilian Ernst

In 2002, North Korea passed market liberalization reforms that allowed market forces to determine food prices. In the years to follow, the number of North Korean defectors arriving in South Korea rose considerably, and the number of female defectors skyrocketed. This paper, which appears in North Korean Review, Vol. 12, No. 2 (Fall 2016), investigates the increase in female defectors from North Korea to South Korea. It uses satellite imagery to measure activity in North Korean markets, and demonstrates a correlation between night-time

lights emitted by a black market in Sinuiju and female defection to South Korea through China. It concludes that the increase in North Korean female defectors is related to women's higher mobility, which is a benefit of their leading role in North Korean markets.
