Gli elementi del disegno - John Ruskin

Anche nei periodi di più intensa attività, quando dalla sua penna nascevano opere quali i "Pittori moderni" o "Le pietre di Venezia", John Ruskin dedicava diverse ore al giorno al disegno e alla pittura. Rarissimo esempio di teorico capace di tradurre in pratica artistica i principi che enunciava, nell'inverno 1856-1857 decise di acconsentire a suo modo alle richieste di tanti aspiranti allievi, e scrisse "Gli elementi del disegno". Da allora innumerevoli studenti, dilettanti e artisti di fama hanno letto questo manuale con pari ammirazione, e se l'autore proclamò di avervi trasfuso il metodo di Leonardo, Monet non esitò ad affermare che i nove decimi dell'impalcatura teorica dell'Impressionismo erano contenuti nelle sue pagine. Pagine che, presentandosi sotto forma di lettere a uno studente, prendono le mosse dagli «esercizi preliminari» - senza trascurare gli aspetti più pratici (che tipo di pennini da disegno comprare, come stendere le ombreggiature in modo perfettamente uniforme) - per poi affrontare il «disegno dal vero». Ruskin spiega con chiarezza esemplare, ammonisce, incoraggia, ha sempre in serbo il consiglio giusto, e anticipa con intuito infallibile il sorgere delle difficoltà, in un crescendo di complessità cui corrispondono i progressi dello studente-lettore. Finché il maestro giudica sia il momento

di introdurlo ai segreti del colore - per dominarli, avverte, non basterebbe l'intera vita -, e quindi all'ultima tappa dell'apprendistato: quella «composizione» che Ruskin tratta in dettaglio enunciandone anzitutto le leggi di preminenza, ripetizione, continuità, curvatura, irradiazione, contrasto, interscambio, coerenza e armonia. Entriamo così nelle segrete officine della pittura, e soprattutto impariamo a vedere, iniziando a comprendere, finalmente, i segreti dei maestri nascosti nei più minuti dettagli - e ritrovandoci, inevitabilmente, con il prepotente desiderio di cimentarci a nostra volta con matita e carta da disegno.

Gallucci's Commentary on Dürer's 'Four Books on Human Proportion' - James Hutson

In 1591, Giovanni Paolo Gallucci published his *Della simmetria dei corpi humani*, an Italian translation of Albrecht Dürer's *Four Books on Human Proportion*. While Dürer's treatise had been translated earlier in the sixteenth-century into French and Latin, it was Gallucci's Italian translation that endured in popularity as the most cited version of the text in later Baroque treatises, covering topics that were seen as central to arts education, connoisseurship, patronage, and the wider appreciation of the studia humanitatis in general. The text centres on the relationships between beauty and proportion, macrocosm and microcosm: relationships that were not only essential to the

visual arts in the early modern era, but that cut across a range of disciplines - music, physiognomics and humoral readings, astronomy, astrology and cosmology, theology and philosophy, even mnemonics and poetry. In his version of the text, Gallucci expanded the educational potential of the treatise by adding a Preface, a Life of Dürer, and a Fifth Book providing a philosophical framework within which to interpret Dürer's previous sections. This translation is the first to make these original contributions by Gallucci accessible to an English-speaking audience. Gallucci's contributions illuminate the significance of symmetry and proportion in the contemporary education of the early modern era, informing our understanding of the intellectual history of this period, and the development of art theory and criticism. This is a valuable resource to early modern scholars and students alike, especially those specialising in history of art, philosophy, history of science, and poetry. Il restauro architettonico non è disciplina di certezze: non è affrontabile con un metodo in genere condiviso e confortante come accade, solitamente, dovendo calcolare l'armatura di un pilastro o la portata di una tubazione. Il termine stesso ha subito nel tempo continue trasformazioni, rendendo ancor più complesso questo campo di competenze e di pratiche applicazioni. Bisogna pertanto accettare questa variabilità di significati per penetrare in un

mondo così multiforme e spesso difficile, alla ricerca di conoscenza piuttosto che di verità. Da quando, sul finire del diciottesimo secolo, il restauro nasce come disciplina autonoma, l'urgenza di darvi uno statuto è stata espressa da studiosi molto diversi tra loro: architetti, ingegneri, storici, filosofi. Ciascuno ha proposto tesi e principi partendo dalla specificità della propria formazione, ma anche influenzato, certamente, dallo spirito dei tempi. Nel febbraio del 1969, a Cambridge, su una panchina davanti al fiume Charles, Borges incontra un uomo che ha la sua stessa voce e gli è più intimo di un figlio nato dalla sua carne. L'uomo è Borges ventenne, a Ginevra, seduto su una panchina davanti al fiume Rodano. Comincia così, con un vertiginoso ritorno al «vecchio tema del doppio» e alle atmosfere lucidamente visionarie degli scritti degli anni Quaranta, "Il libro di sabbia", che raccoglie tredici, memorabili, racconti - cui se ne aggiungono qui, in appendice, altri quattro mai radunati in volume. Racconti di carattere fantastico. O forse sogni. O forse incontri con apparizioni spettrali: Ulrica, alta e lieve, labile riflesso di una saga nordica; una casa inconcepibile e il suo terrificante ospite; un vecchio, pallido e severo, venuto da un futuro dove si insegna l'arte di dimenticare. Ma anche incontri con oggetti da incubo, da cui paiono sprigionarsi il caos o la divinità: il disco di Odino, a un solo lato e invisibile, che un taglialegna strappa al re dei Secgens e poi cercherà invano; il diabolico libro di sabbia, che non ha né inizio né fine né centro né ordine, e infama e corrompe la realtà; le «tigri blu», pietruzze lisce e rotonde capaci di riprodursi e di minare la scienza della matematica. Incontri, tutti, destinati a «ramificarsi nell'ospitale immaginazione» di chi

li legge, quasi fossero scaturiti, miracolosamente, dai suoi stessi sogni. «In questi esercizi da cieco» scrive Borges «ho voluto essere fedele all'esempio di Wells: la congiunzione di uno stile piano, a volte quasi orale, con una trama impossibile» - e il risultato è una prosa pacata ed essenziale, ma come non mai modulata e musicale.

[English]: After centuries of submission to the foreign rulers, between the eighteenth and the nineteenth century the South of Italy took a leading role in the European political landscape, on one hand absorbing in its culture the huge heritage of values and knowledge of those civilizations, on the other hand appealing to its own scientists, intellectuals and technicians' fervid minds to achieve relevant international goals in the field of the public and urbanistic works. Kings, such as Charles of Bourbon and Ferdinand II, were the main promoters of this ransom and of the achieved primacies.

Rummaging through the iconographic documents passed on their desks, nowadays rearranged in the Neapolitan National library Palatine collection and consulting the volumes of the Royal library, it turns out a great turmoil of ideas and projects, but also the confirmation of the large amount of potentialities unfortunately not completely expressed by the Neapolitan State: it occurred, it should be said, not only as a consequence of the end of the kingdom, but also as a result of the specific political responsibility of that dynasty: Unfortunately Italy's unification didn't enhance the heritage of these experiences, nor it rectified the structural inadequacies of the former regime; on the contrary the new State often contributed to increase them, stifling a socio-economic promise of development still today unrealized./ [Italiano]: Dopo secoli di sottomissione alle potenze straniere, tra Sette e Ottocento il Mezzogiorno d'Italia assunse un ruolo di grande prestigio nel panorama europeo, da un lato introiettando nella propria cultura il cospicuo patrimonio di valori e conoscenze di quelle civiltà, dall'altro facendo leva sulle fervide menti dei propri scienziati, intellettuali e tecnici per raggiungere traguardi di assoluto rilievo internazionale nel campo delle

opere pubbliche e dell'urbanistica. Sovrani come Carlo di Borbone e Ferdinando II furono i principali promotori di questo riscatto e dei primati conseguiti. Frugando tra i documenti iconografici transitati sulla loro scrivania, oggi riordinati nella raccolta Palatina della Biblioteca Nazionale di Napoli, e interrogando i volumi della Biblioteca Reale, si scopre un ricco fermento di idee e di progettualità, ma anche la conferma del ricco quadro delle potenzialità purtroppo non pienamente espresse dallo Stato napoletano: ciò, va detto, non soltanto a seguito della fine del Regno, ma anche per le precise responsabilità politiche di quella dinastia. Purtroppo con l'Unità d'Italia tale patrimonio di esperienze non fu valorizzato, né corrette le deficienze strutturali del passato regime; anzi, il nuovo Stato contribuì sovente ad amplificarle, soffocando una promessa di sviluppo socio-economico che resta ancor oggi inattuata.

I believe that (irrespective of differences in individual temper and character) the excellence of an artist, as such, depends wholly on refinement of perception, and that it is this, mainly, which a master or a school can teach; so that while powers of invention distinguish man from man, powers of perception distinguish school from school. All great schools enforce delicacy of drawing and subtlety of sight: and the only rule which I have, as yet, found to be without exception respecting art, is that all great art is delicate. I am nearly convinced, that when once we see keenly enough, there is very little difficulty in drawing what we see; but, even supposing that this difficulty be still great, I believe that the sight is a more important thing than the drawing; and I would rather teach drawing that my pupils may learn to love Nature, than teach the looking at Nature that they may learn to draw...

Suite Française is both a brilliant novel of wartime and an extraordinary historical document. An unmatched evocation of the exodus from Paris after the German invasion of 1940, and of life under the Nazi occupation, it was written by the esteemed French novelist Irène Némirovsky as events unfolded around her. This haunting masterpiece has been hailed by European critics as a War and Peace for the Second World War. Though she conceived the book as a five-part work (based on the form of Beethoven's Fifth Symphony), Irène Némirovsky was able to write only the first two parts, Storm in June and Dolce, before she was arrested in July 1942. She died in Auschwitz the following month. The manuscript was saved by her young daughter Denise; it was only decades later that Denise learned that what she had imagined was her mother's journal was in fact an invaluable work of art. Storm in June takes place in the tumult of the evacuation from Paris in 1940, just before the arrival of the invading German army. It moves vividly between different levels of

society—from the wealthy Péricand family, whose servants pack up their possessions for them, to a group of orphans from the 16th arrondissement escaping in a military truck. Némirovsky's immense canvas includes deserting soldiers and terrified secretaries, cynical bank directors and hapless priests, egotistical writers and hardscrabble prostitutes—all thrown together in a chaotic attempt to escape the capital. Moving between them chapter by chapter, this thrilling novel describes a journey hampered and in some cases abandoned because of confusion, shelling, rumour, lack of supplies, bad luck and ordinary human weakness. Cars break down or are stolen; relatives are forgotten; friends are divided; but there are also moments of love and charity. Throughout, whether depicting saintly forbearance or the basest selfishness, Storm in June neither sweetens nor demonizes its characters; unsentimentally, with stunning perceptiveness, Némirovsky shows the complexities that mean no-one is simply a hero or villain. The second volume, *Dolce*, is set in the German-occupied village of Bussy. Again,

Némirovsky switches seamlessly between social strata, from tenant farmers to the local aristocracy. The focus, however, is on the delicate, secret love affair between a German soldier and the French woman in whose house he has been billeted; the passion, doubts and deceits of their burgeoning relationship echo the complex mixture of hostility and acceptance felt by the occupied community as a whole. Némirovsky is amazingly sensitive in her depiction of changing, often contradictory emotions, but her attention to the personal is matched by her sharp-eyed discussion of small-town life and the politics of occupation. In this myth-dissolving book, the French villagers see the Germans as oppressive warriors, but also as handsome young men, and occupation does nothing to remedy the condescension and envy that bedevil relations between rich and poor. Quite apart from the astonishing story of its survival, *Suite Française* is a novel of genius and lasting artistic value. Subtle, often fiercely ironic, and deeply compassionate, it is both a piercing record of its time and a humane, profoundly moving novel.
