Capitalism in the Age of Globalization - Samir Amin 2014-02-13

His books include *The Three Orders*; *The Age of Cathedrals*; *The Knight, the Lady, and the Priest*; *Love and Marriage in the Middle Ages*; and *History Continues*, all published by the University of Chicago Press.

He became the overseer or manager of the Egypt sugar plantation near the small port of Savanna la Mar. He stayed in Jamaica until his death in 1786. He wrote a diary, which eventually ran to some 10,000 pages, and this diary became an important historical document on slavery and history of Jamaica.
