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Toulouse-Lautrec and Montmartre - Richard Thomson 2006

Childhood illness and injuries steered Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec (1864-1901) away from customary rural aristocratic avocations and toward a profession as an artist. He became a painter, draftsman, and lithographer whose work was immersed in famously hedonistic, fin-de-siècle Paris. In his hands, advertising posters were raised to a high art; he portrayed the nightlife of Montmartre—circuses, cafés, dance halls, and brothels—with clear, bold color and a certain seamy panache that is instantly recognizable as his. His much mythologized life has found its way into many biographies and into two feature-length movies called *Moulin Rouge*. Lavishly illustrated with 370 color plates, *Toulouse-Lautrec and Montmartre* is the first major work to present the artist's oeuvre in the context of Montmartre's lively art scene from roughly 1885 to 1901. Accompanying an exhibition of the same name at the National Gallery of Art and The Art Institute of Chicago, the book features the important paintings, drawings, prints, and posters Toulouse-Lautrec made on Montmartre subjects. It also includes masterpieces by contemporaries he inspired or who inspired him—Degas, Van Gogh, Picasso, and others—as well as rarely seen illustrations, lithographs, photographs, and ephemera of the era. And it discusses the artists, writers, actors, singers, and dancers who formed Toulouse-Lautrec's circle. The book's gracefully written essays by Richard Thomson, Phillip Dennis Cate, and Mary Weaver Chapin, with Florence E. Coman, address these themes in light of the rise of the color poster, the proliferation of new forms of entertainment, and the emergence of a celebrity-oriented popular culture. *Toulouse-Lautrec and Montmartre* evokes a colorful, chaotic era, and adds a new dimension to our understanding of the art of Toulouse-Lautrec.

The Showgirl Costume - Jane Merrill 2018-11-30

Fashion is synonymous with change yet the iconic showgirl costume—feathers, sparkle and revealing clothes—has remained largely unchanged since the early 20th century. Beginning in the 1800s, a couture of the risqué evolved from Paris nightclubs to Las Vegas casinos. The concept of glamour itself was based on what Parisian courtesans and burlesque performers wore. A tall pretty girl with headdress, nude core with spangles, high heels and dramatic makeup became a Gallic symbol and later the trademark of Hollywood musicals. France exported costumes and millinery—as well as whole productions from the *Moulin Rouge*, the Lido and Folies Bergère—to the U.S. and the world. More recently, cabaret styling has translated into today's day, sport and evening clothes.

These include Walter Richard Sickert, Arthur Melville, John Duncan Fergusson, William Nicholson and James Pryde. An exhibition of this work, directly tied to the content of the book, will open at the National Galleries of Scotland on 16th October 2018.

Josephine Baker in Art and Life - Bennetta Jules-Rosette 2007

Toulouse-Lautrec - Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec 1969

The world of Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec was inhabited by denizens of the street and night life of fin-de-siècle Paris - with its dance halls, bars, brothels and circuses. Portraying this world in his paintings, drawings, posters and prints, Lautrec created a vibrant body of art that earned him lasting renown. Lautrec was born in 1864 into one of the oldest noble families in France. At the age of 13 it was discovered that he suffered from a genetic defect that prevented the bones in his legs from continuing to grow. Small in stature and singular in appearance, Lautrec lived his life with a passionate intensity, choosing to dwell among the Bohemian and exotic characters he depicted in his canvases. He died at the age of 37 after excessive drinking had severely debilitated and finally destroyed him. During his short career, however, he not only painted, drew, and designed posters, but also worked with stained glass and bookbindings. The essays in this book discuss the full range of Lautrec's career and artistic activities - from his youthful sketchbooks and examples of applied art to the seminal pictures and posters at the end of his life. The essays also focus on the cultural milieu and social history of the period, analyzing the marketplace in which Lautrec worked, the implications of his exhibitions and his association with other artists, designers and literary figures.
